READING EDUCATION ASSISTANCE DOGS

Reading dogs?? Not quite.....

The Reading Education Assistance Dogs (R.E.A.D.) program improves children's reading and communication skills by employing a powerful method: reading to a dog. R.E.A.D. dogs are registered therapy animals who volunteer with their owner/handlers as a team. Kids in kindergarten through third grade come to the library every Wednesday morning to participate. If your child is in this age

group, encourage him or her to sign up at the beginning of the school year. Even reluctant readers discover this experience to be relaxing and enjoyable. Home school families may also participate by contacting the library. 

Paintings on display in March



CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are now needed for the following positions:

· One-on-one computer tutors

Schedule is flexible and works according to what is convenient for both student and tutor. Some may require one meeting, while others may need several meetings depending on their goals.

Home-Bound Delivery Service

Help us provide library service to those who cannot get to the library. This volunteer position will be an "as needed" service, for which you would be asked to deliver and/or pick-up materials for one or two residents about once per month.

Shelvers

Currently, these shelving shifts are needed: Second Saturday of each month, 10:30-12:00; and, Mondays for 30 minutes in the afternoon (the time is somewhat flexible). Some shelf reading-to keep materials in order—will also be performed.

Summer Library Program Volunteers Several adult or older teen volunteers are needed for craft day and boat race day. Call to find out how you can help.

Reading Buddies

Adults or Teens 12 and older are needed to provide reading help and encouragement to younger readers while

they participate in the library reading program over the summer. Reading Buddies will meet with their partner approximately two

times per week (or more if you'd like!) at the library in the meeting room.

Young Performers

Teens and older grade schoolaged kids are needed to help perform two short stories for our June 30th program.

There are no speaking parts other than the story reader. Performers are needed to manipulate the scenery, props, sound and lights. 6-8 rehearsals will be scheduled throughout June. The librarian will hold informational meetings at the high School and Grade Schools. Interested Homeschooled children can call the library to find out when these meetings will be held.
